

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

Interim Update

Dear friends,

First, thank you to all who took the time to contribute information on the "Decades Boards," came to a congregational conversation, or reached out to a member of the Mission Study Group. Your input, thoughtfulness, care for this congregation and more, are invaluable as we live into this interim process.

Your info has been gathered by the Mission Study Group and, by the time you read this article, the group will have met for a "writing day" on March 19, 2022. Their task is to write up the Mission Study for our church. After the Mission Study is approved by the Session, it will go to the Presbytery's Committee on Ministry (COM). When COM approves it, they will give us permission to call a Pastoral Nominating Committee (PNC). I'll keep you posted as we go through each of those steps.

First Presbyterian Church in Muskegon is "A Place to Worship. A Place to Belong." Should we add "A Place to Serve," to our tagline?

Also, the Session will be discerning if this statement will be our new Mission Statement:

First Presbyterian Church of Muskegon's mission is to nourish minds, bodies and spirits, crossing boundaries and devoting ourselves to serve in the name and the spirit of Jesus Christ. Rooted deeply enough to risk being reshaped, we will have the courage to continually explore new ways to move in the direction which the church may be called by God.

Prayers and longings often don't seem to be enough, however. We know how to pray but don't know what to do or how to find our way forward. Have you ever felt that way? But if we listen to our prayers, they may help lead us. If we remember that even our prayers rise from God's Spirit in us, they may give us guidance. They may offer light to a path that can seem dark and indiscernible.

When we pray for each other in times of need, we are affirming that we are a group of Christ followers who care for each other. The next step of these prayers may lead us to an action like bringing over a meal to someone or helping in some other way. These prayers take us deeper into community.



The Changing Job of a Church Musician

Ask any church musician what's new in their work, and many will answer that, in the past few years, LOTS! Only a few years ago, church musicians simply bought or borrowed hard copy music for use in services and used it, leaving it to publishers to compensate composers for their works. Now, few church musicians **only** rehearse and



provide or lead music; many now also have responsibilities relating to copyright and licensing of materials. One such duty is supplying the attribution information you see at the end of a service:

My Shepherd Shall Supply My Need. One License Song #206725. Trad. Southern Hymn | Isaac Watts, Arr. Virgil Thomson. ©1938, 1947 H. W. Gray Co., Inc. One License #A-720490.

There are a couple of reasons for this increased emphasis on licensing, the first being the proliferation of methods of adapting and disseminating works, and the ease of broadcasting via the internet ("streaming") have resulted in an increased opportunities for use–authorized and not–of creative works, and an increased need to protect creators and to ensure that they're compensated for their creative contributions to our lives. Changes in copyright laws now allow creators to specify whether and how works can be shared. Licensing clearinghouses have sprung up to assist church musicians in researching and reporting use of works and facilitating the flow of revenue generated by use of their works to its creators.

A second dramatic shift in church musicians' duties resulted from the Coronavirus pandemic. Forced to shut down in-person worship for a period of time, churches were compelled to find other means of carrying on their work. Like so many churches, FPC Muskegon climbed a steep learning curve in the spring of 2020 to master streaming worship services, and to provide virtual means of conducting church business and enjoying fellowship. Previously the bailiwick of commercial musicians, streaming became a weekly reality for churches, and, with it, researching permissions and reporting music used in worship to the appropriate licensing agencies became a regular task.

FPC Muskegon has made a firm commitment to honor copyright and licensing for materials used in worship and church communications. This is important work for everyone in the church, not only because non-compliance can result in penalties such as loss of streaming rights and fines, but because through its compliance, the church is acting justly by ensuring that the people whose works adds depth to our worship are compensated. I'm proud to be a part of FPC's copyright and licensing compliance efforts, and encourage you to contact me if you have questions about it.

Dear Members and Friends,

The pandemic has stretched the Church in many ways — but we are still very much ... *here*. Although it was surely hard at first, we have expanded our thinking and our doing in new and innovative ways to close the distance and be together. We have continued to gather for worship. We have continued to build and shape community. We have continued to take care of one another. And on top of all that, we have continued to come together to serve those in need, both here in our own community and all over the world through our participation in special offerings and in the spirit of shared mission. Despite difficulty, struggle and loss, the Church continues to declare its presence in the world, through numerous means, certainly, but toward the same purpose.

In Isaiah 58, the prophet reminds us of time and again that God's people belong with those in need, releasing people from the bonds of injustice and with the hungry whom we are to welcome into our homes. And in Matthew 25, Jesus calls the Church to be with those who are thirsty, imprisoned and suffering illness.

Through our Church, we connect with one another, in whatever way we are able, and celebrate the many ways God connects with us. During Lent, we celebrate that God connects *with us* through Jesus' resurrection and connects *us with* "those who have least" — that's how Matthew 25 puts it — and that's what One Great Hour of Sharing (OGHS) is all about. Connecting. People who experience oppression, need, loss or lack, *those* are the people with whom Jesus connected, and they are the people with whom we are invited to connect today.

We challenge each of you to consider increasing your gift to the One Great Hour of Sharing offering — especially in light of the challenges we have witnessed in Ukraine over the last month, and in the world over the past year. OGHS AND UKRAINE

Your gifts to One Great Hour of Sharing allow for an immediate response from Presbyterian Disaster Assistance (PDA) when emergencies first occur, often responding to crises that never make it into the news.

Regarding the crisis in Ukraine, PDA was able to provide urgent funding to trusted, established partners with the expertise to carry out humanitarian aid. Reformed and Orthodox church partners, like the Community of St. Egidio and Hungarian Reformed Church Aid, are working closely with local churches and organizations to provide food, water, clothing, shelter, psychosocial support and other basic items for survival. They are the "boots on the ground," listening and responding to the needs of those impacted.

BLANKET SUNDAY

Generous First Presbyterian Church people donated 33 blankets to Mission for Area People and Every Woman's Place and \$425 to Church World Service. These special blankets will warm the hearts and bodies of our brothers, sisters, and children around town and in other parts of the country and world. Bright colors and patterns, handmade quilts, and interesting characters on the blankets will increase the joy of the people who receive them. The \$425 donated to Church World Service allows the agency to purchase and distribute 42 blankets for refugees and natural disaster survivors. Thank you.

For the month of February income continued to keep pace with expenses helped by a gift from a deceased member of \$5,000 through the Grand Haven Community Foundation. These last two months saw large expenses for Apportionments (\$8,080 in January) and Insurance for the building, van, and Workman's Comp coverage (\$7,695 in February). These are traditionally fully paid early each year.

As everyone knows, Wall Street has been struggling with the issues in Europe and this has impacted the market price of our shares in Vanguard. However, we have done better than the broader market as a result of the conservative funds we chose. Share prices vary with the overall market but don't directly affect the dividend income we rely on and there is no indication these market conditions will affect the funds ability to continue paying these dividends.

Finally, I would like to remind everyone that the budget approved by Session projects spending for salaries and councils. However, from time-to-time unforeseen needs may arise. With those circumstances in mind, Session approved in 2020, the Project Proposal Form for requesting additional non-budgeted money. This provides a structured path for requests for funding in excess of \$1,000, to include three quotes, signed by the requesting council moderator, submitted to Finance Council, and then presented to Session. This gives Finance the opportunity to review the request, determine if funds are available to meet the request, and to submit the Project Proposal and its recommendations at the next Session meeting. Following this process will ensure that requests are presented at Session with the least delay.
